Marchwood Parishoners Meeting

Minutes of the Annual Parish Meeting held at Marchwood Village Hall on Monday 28 April 2025 commencing at 7.00pm.

Present: Marchwood Parish Councillors, District Councillor R Young, Hampshire County Councillor David Harrison, members of the public. Cllr John Case – In the Chair

Also in attendance: T Dudley, Parish Clerk, A Woodward, Deputy Parish Clerk/RFO.

At the request of the parishioners, the **Waterside Changemakers** presented the outcome of public consultation.

The consultation had shown there was a need for an improved bus service. The existing bus stop at Twiggs Lane did not suit many parishioners due to the distance away from the center and wider areas of the village.

It was recommended that alongside buses coming through the village an increase of half hourly service would be beneficial to many residents.

Recent approved development at Cork Farm would increase the need for an improved service, in addition land at Bury and Tavells was expected to be developed in the future.

The connection between the existing bus service and trains was not coordinated to enable residents to travel further afield for work or pleasure.

The parishioners present stated that the public deserved a better bus service, the frequency and timing need to be improved, frequency being the main problem.

Traveling to work and for health care was not conducive to catching the bus. There was a need and desire to persuade operators to moderate services.

Parishioners were required to travel to Southampton or Lymington for medical care, this was not do-able by bus without hours of waiting for a bus due to the lack of service.

A bus service was required to come through the village and not just on the outskirts, many parishioners found it difficult to walk to the existing bus stop.

PC Emma Worthington was introduced to residents.

PC Worthington introduced herself to the parishioners. Having been working in the area since 2007, locally at Milbrook, Shirley and Lyndhurst, Neighbourhood team she was very familiar with the geographical area.

She explained there had been very limited resources available in recent times however, more recently things had improved with 4 PCSO's and 5 PCs within the local team.

Following severe anti-social behavior problems, results had been achieved culminating

in a lead offender being given a 'Criminal Behavior Order'. Matters had consequently been improved since the person being given the order had not re-offended. He was known to be one of the leaders of a group of offenders.

Any arrest of a youth offender meant an officer had up to a whole day to complete the associated paperwork.

She further considered the lack of amenities for young people was possibly a reason for the anti-social behavior increase in modern times along with social media.

Members of the public were urged to report all incidents via 101, if the police were not made aware they could not take the necessary actions to investigate incidents. Evidence from ring doorbells, CCTV were essential in criminal prosecutions. 'See it – Report it'.

The Chairman asked if the police would provide an article for the Marchwood Village News giving guidance on who residents should report incidents to and how they could help the police to a successful prosecution.

Residents raised issues of HGV vehicles driving in an unsafe manner particularly through Twiggs Lane, others raised issues with parents dropping off children in the area; Marchwood CofE school on pavements and in dangerous positions.

Further concerns regarding vehicles exceeding the weight limit and speeding was a regular occurrence. Parking on pavements preventing wheelchair/pushchair access resulting in residents having to walk along the road was another frequent occurrence.

PC Worthington replied that the police can consider issuing fixed penalty notices for vehicles causing an obstruction, she will also seek advice on how to tackle the vehicle weight issue.

A Councillor raised the issue of vehicles turning right at Staphill Road junction despite it being a no right turn junction.

PC Worthington explained that the camera was not a police camera but a local authority one therefore enforcement was with Hampshire County Council.

Councillor Harrison stated that fines should be being issued at this time and that he would look in to why they were not.

Residents were encouraged to report more for action to be taken.

**Report for Marchwood Parish Council 28th April 2025
From County Councillor David Harrison**

As I am sure you will know, the elections for seats on Hampshire County Council, planned for May 1st have been cancelled. It means I have been asked to continue in the role for an extra year. This is to facilitate plans for Devolution and Local

Government Reorganisation, which will probably result in the abolition of Hampshire County Council and New Forest District Council.

I don't know if elections will take place in May 2026, given that the County Council won't likely exist for more than 12 months after that date. I don't favour the abolition of either Authority, but this is being driven by government and those in charge at the Council who think that the changes will lead to greater efficiencies and more control "locally" over how funding is allocated.

In the meantime, it is pretty much "business as usual", which for some years now has involved myself in trying to achieve savings to address a serious and rising deficit (currently £95 million)... in other words, cutting services and increasing the cost of delivering them to users, where possible.

Some of the most senior officers have left, or announced they are leaving. The remaining ones openly admit that the authority is moving to a situation in which only statutory services will remain.

At present there is a public consultation involving proposed cuts to planned highway maintenance, older adults' day services, Post 16 Transport and School Transport. These conclude on the 7th of May. Details on the HCC website.

For now, we still have our local Household Waste Recycling Centre. It has been saved from closure twice following vigorous campaigns, but I am not at all sure that it has a long-term future given the financial situation.

I have been pressing Officers for an update on the proposed A326 road widening scheme. There is a level of anxiety about what is planned. It is a very long time since the public consultation of early plans, without details. I have suggested that this could incorporate a new bus stop (both sides) but this depends on crossing arrangements for pedestrians (another important element of the scheme).

You may have heard about a proposal from a private company to start running a rail passenger service to Marchwood, linking it to Totton, Southampton Central, Hook and Waterloo. I am meeting with the representatives / owner of Alliance rail to discuss details.

I won't know if I have any grant budget to support community projects until the Autumn.

I have taken on a new role as a volunteer Governor with Hampshire & IOW Healthcare NHS Foundation Trust (having been appointed by Hampshire County Council).

Wearing my hat as a Board Member of the New Forest National Park, I have highlighted plans by Forestry England to introduce car parking charges in the car parks they manage. This news has attracted quite a lot of interest. I am trying to encourage them to publish detailed plans for public consultation. There are concerns about verge parking, putting off people from visiting the forest, what happens about people using the car parks for work purposes, what level of charges there might be, whether a discount scheme for local will be offered (to name but a few).

Councillors raised issue with the lack of consultation with the parish regarding works on the A326 and requested that the parish council be consulted on proposed plans. There were lots of unanswered question including why the access to the docks in Marchwood did not get included in the proposals.

Councillor Harrison stated that the design was configured to have least impact on the National Park.

The proposed works was expected to take five years to complete with consequences being felt on the roads through Marchwood.

Funding for the work on the A326 had been agreed.

District Councillor Richard Young - Report for Marchwood Annual Parish Meeting

The big issue that has dominated much of NFDC business since just before Christmas 2024 has undoubtedly been Local Government reorganisation. This is a direct unavoidable consequence for 15 existing authorities across Hampshire as a result of Hampshire County Councils decision to be a "fast track" authority under devolution.

To be absolutely clear, it is not a path that NFDC have chosen or indeed welcomed. At the time of writing this we do not yet know with any degree of certainty the geographic makeup of the proposed new unitary authority covering the New Forest.

NFDC has been robustly clear in our position. Some councils seem to favour a move to very large councils, NFDC do not. Some councils want to make a case from breaking up the existing districts like the New Forest, NFDC do not.

My NFDC colleagues and I also do not believe that an even bigger council further and further away from local people is the right way forward. I am pleased that NFDC shares my view in that we will therefore not support any proposal that splits our historic New Forest communities or forces us into an urban lead authority.

In terms of NFDC services, on 14th April 2025 the council commenced deliveries of new wheeled bins and food waste caddies to the "phase 1" areas of the New Forest prior to that new waste collection service starting in June.

Marchwood and surrounding communities are in "phase 3" of the new service which is scheduled to commence here in March 2026. In advance of this NFDC recently completed its move from the old and cramped Clay meadow (Hounsdown) depot to a purpose built spacious and modern facility at Hardley Industrial Estate just off of the A326.

Further information about the changes to waste collection services were recently circulated to all households across the New Forest with copies of this year's council tax bills which recently came through the mail. Additional targeted mailing, social media posts, and emails will continue to take place to ensure that all residents have multiple opportunities to find out everything about how household waste will be collected in the future.

As someone who was raised on a New Forest council housing estate I have first-hand experience of the incredibly challenging local housing market, whether privately renting, buying, or seeking access to social housing.

Over the last year I have worked closely with a significant number of local families to support them with their housing needs. It is so important that where local residential development takes place, we strive to ensure that quality affordable homes are delivered which complement our existing community. I was recently successful in arguing for NFDC to refuse planning permission to convert the former Avondale Lodge care home on Hythe Road into a cramped poor quality 12-bedroom House of Multiple Occupancy (HMO).

However, I do hope that the applicant comes back with a revised plan that better fits the village, that brings an unused property back into use, and which provides high quality residential accommodation for future members of our community.

As a frequent regular user of public transport, I continue to advocate for better public transport for Marchwood. Being just over a mile (as the crow flies) from Southampton City Centre yet having but one solitary bus per hour serving Marchwood is frankly an appalling level of public transport provision.

I am therefore keen to see any investment in public transport on the waterside be prioritised upon increasing the frequency of the number 8 bus service which is the most accessible, convenient, and affordable option for the majority of waterside residents. There have also been recent further proposals to bring the local rail line back into passenger use through a privately funded "open access application" to the Office for Rail and Road by Alliance Rail.

This could potentially offer direct trains to Totton, Southampton, Southampton Airport Parkway, Eastleigh, Basingstoke, Hook, and London Waterloo. A decision on this proposal is expected from the ORR in the Autumn. Whilst on the face of it there are undoubted positives for our community in this proposal, my primary concerns are how far more frequent crossing closures might impact Marchwood and Totton and given how Marchwood is the current proposed "end point" of this new service how would any associated car parking be managed in the village.

It appears rather obvious to me that Marchwood could quickly be swamped by rail commuters leaving their vehicles scattered around nearby residential village roads where there are presently no parking restrictions in place. Both impacting existing residents parking and making the village more hazardous for pedestrians to navigate on foot.

These are both significant and important issues for our village that must be properly addressed and fully answered well before any rail service commences operation.

Over the last year I have made a number of councillors community grant awards to support both Marchwood Infant and Junior Schools, the Party in The Park music event, and the Marchwood Womens Institute "Singing with Friends" group which provides a welcome opportunity to combat isolation in our community.

I look forward to continuing to support our village in everything that I do over the coming year. Thank you all for your ongoing support and collaboration over the previous twelve months, and as always if I can be of any further assistance I can best be reached:

Report from the Chairman Marchwood Parish Council

Spring seems to have arrived in recent weeks, and with it, the many green open spaces around Marchwood are again bursting back into life. The first real splash of colour after a grey winter, daffodils are a sure sign that spring is coming. The mild weather this year has brought them out early.

Recently, we have been awoken to the dawn chorus; our trees are coming into leaf, and the blossom trees add colour around the village.

Whilst nature works its magic, our Landscape & Groundwork Team is also working hard to help things get on their way. They work tirelessly to maintain and, where necessary, improve the amenities available to everyone around the village.

Springtime is my favourite time of the year. Nature's regeneration, new beginnings, and much to look forward to as the clocks go forward and we herald in the lighter evenings.

I know we all value our green and open spaces; after all, it is one of Marchwood's finest attributes, making it a great place to live.

Unfortunately, protecting and enhancing our local environment, promoting good management and efficiency whilst supporting our local community and maintaining the Parish for the benefit of all residents comes with an unavoidable cost.

If you have read my previous Parish Chairman Reports, you will know how many times I have written about the number of trees in our village. They are both a blessing and a curse.

Some parishioners may not be aware that the Council manages approximately 80 acres of open space throughout the village. The Parish Council has over a thousand trees that must be inspected and maintained yearly.

We do that on a yearly cycle with trees categorised as red (immediate works), amber (scheduled works) and green (needs work but not urgently).

Our independent annual inspection regularly identifies more trees needing attention during the coming months.

The last few years have seen an unprecedented draw on the Parish Council's tree budget. Tree maintenance and ensuring a safe environment are legal requirements, so taking no action wasn't a viable option for the problem.

Marchwood has proportionally the same or greater density of trees and green open spaces as our neighbouring parishes. But, unlike them, we have fewer Council Taxpayers, thus making it harder to spread the cost of ensuring a safe environment and meeting the legal requirements.

A change in legislation will require us to provide both waste and recycling bins in 2027, and we await the full extent of the cost implications. Currently, the Council operates and manages five playparks, approximately 85 acres of open space with over 1,000 trees, hedgerows and fencing, a skatepark, and 25 dog bins.

Five employees are employed to manage all of these assets and the statutory administration of the Council; our Landscape & Groundwork Team consists of 3 full-time employees and two full-time Management and Finance personnel.

As sole trustees of the Lloyds Recreation Grounds, the Council also maintains the Pavilion, sports facilities and open space.

The year 2024 was challenging for the Parish Council, resulting in the difficult decision of raising the precept much higher than we wanted for 2025-26.

However, providing some background on how the Parish Council makes decisions regarding the precept is necessary.

We are required to submit our precept (budget) to the New Forest District Council (NFDC) before 1 April 2025 by 31 January 2025. This is a statutory requirement.

The budget planning process begins in September, with all committees reviewing the existing budget and planning expenditures for the forthcoming year. We cannot foresee what will happen with inflation or plan for the unexpected. We do plan prudently for what we believe our expenditure will be.

After careful consideration, the Parish Council decided at its meeting in December that an increase in the precept could not be avoided.

We took the tough decision to raise the precept for 2025-26. A band D property will see an increase in the Council tax of £9.04 per annum or £0.75p monthly.

Oversight of the Council's finances rests with our Policy and Resource Committee, chaired by Councillor Daryll Hindle, which undertakes forensic analysis of the Council's expenditure and plans to ensure financial probity and transparency of our income and spending.

I assure you that councillors do not take the decision lightly when raising the precept.

Our expenditure and income is published on the Council's website before the meetings. Residents are more than welcome to attend any of our Council and Committee meetings to discuss items on the agenda and have your say.

Our staffing is at the lowest level to maintain service delivery, and all other budget expenditures are constantly under review.

One unexpected pressure on our finances was the Autumn Budget announcement to increase Employer National Insurance Contributions to the staff we employ.

Although The Treasury are "conscious that this will impact the finances of town and parish councils", they have confirmed that councils like us will not be included in a package to compensate public sector bodies for this rise.

Fortunately, due to staff retirement this year the effect of this increase will have no significant impact on our salary costs.

I am pleased to announce that Dave Bartlett and Rob Cockrane, key ground staff members, have been promoted and enjoy their new roles. They have already suggested many new ways to be more efficient and help reduce costs. Their energy and enthusiasm are to be admired and celebrated.

We welcome Gal Tsarfaty to the outdoor team. Gal has already settled in very well and is a proactive team member.

It was my honour to welcome our new vicar, the Reverend Lauren Cheshire, on behalf of the Marchwood Parish Council and our wider community at her collation at the Church of St John the Apostle, Marchwood, on Wednesday, 9 April.

Lauren comes to Marchwood and Eling Parish with a breadth of ministry experience, having worked as a Youth Leader in Evangelical and Anglo-Catholic Churches.

I now turn to how the Parish Council proactively achieves realistic and sustainable cost reductions.

In recent years, vehicle repairs and maintenance have also overrun the planned budget, and there was an unexpected expenditure on repairs and maintenance to the Lloyd Pavilion.

There will always be variations in the budget, but we have measures to ensure we review and evaluate our expenditures regularly. Unfortunately, we have encountered more expenditures than anticipated. Our insurance, electricity, gas, and water charges have all exceeded inflation.

We are pledged to become more carbon neutral and are actively engaged in switching to electric vehicles and leasing rather than incurring significant capital expenditure each time we buy vehicles.

We have decided to sell our two diesel vehicles and move to greener options. Our two silver trucks have proved uneconomical to run and would cause an unacceptable future burden on the Council's financial resources. They were becoming unreliable and required increasing days in the repair shop.

After consultation with our staff, we will be leasing a fully electric drop-sided Ford E-Transit and a plug-in hybrid Ford Connect van, which are fit for purpose for the workloads we have.

My colleague, Counsellor Nigel Buckett, Chairman of the Amenities Committee, provided compelling evidence in his report to the Council, dated 16 December 2024, on why our approach is financially sound and proportionate.

One of the first priorities where we can utilise the new features will be to undertake a 'spring clean' for all our play parks, making them cleaner and even safer for our younger parishioners.

This combination of these utility vehicles provides us greater flexibility to fulfil our outdoor jobs at an affordable price, which leasing offers, as it makes financial planning and forecasting a lot easier in these uncertain times.

As sole trustees of the Lloyd Recreation Ground, the Council maintains the Pavilion, sports facilities, and open space. We are currently reviewing ways to increase our income and reduce our expenditure.

In the 2024-25 financial year, we applied but sadly failed in our bid for a grant to install solar panels on the Pavilion at the Lloyd Recreation Ground.

However, we believe we will succeed during this year's bidding round thanks to the due diligence of our Parish Clerk, Tina Dudley.

In the coming weeks, we hope to publish detailed plans for significantly reducing our energy costs at the Lloyd Pavillion.

We continue to upgrade the lighting to LED to reduce our energy expenditure further.

Our drinks and snack facilities at the Lloyd Recreation Ground continue to provide income and enhance the facilities available to residents. However, we must continue improving the recreational offerings to reap the full benefit of our investment.

We have already received viable suggestions from the community and intend to consult further in the coming months.

The Marchwood Mens Shed continues to work with the Parish and has worked with us by building some picnic benches for parishioners to enjoy the recreational facilities at Lloyd Recreation Ground.

Hopefully, in a few weeks, work will begin on a new footpath that will be a real asset to the village. It will run alongside the military fence in Normandy Way from Cracknore Hard Lane to near the entrance to Autumn Road. This path will make walking through the village safer.

We are also optimistic about finally being able to announce plans for the long-awaited footpath improvements from Kingfisher Way to Normandy Way. This initiative has suffered from many false starts as the Parish Council continues to unlock funding from the New Forest District Council.

Thanks to a grant we received last year, we enhanced several features on our land near the village centre. These include the Falklands Memorial, Millennium Memorial and the grassed area on the corner of Main Road and Oakland Drive.

Undertaking financial prudence gives us an ideal opportunity to explore more community engagement.

I know from speaking to those who attended that they appreciated and enjoyed our Party in the Park and Christmas Fayre. So, we want to replicate how we can organise and run these events with minimal cost to the council funds to make these an annual event if there is a demand.

Indeed, the surplus from the Christmas Fayre has enabled more festive lights to be purchased to make next year's Christmas Fayre even better.

We have moved the event to Saturday, 13 December 2025, to allow our younger parishioners to attend and enjoy knowing they don't have school to attend the next day.

As some of you might have noticed, we have been busy developing and enhancing our Parish Website, making it more visually appealing and informative and helping parishioners keep up to date on local activities that may affect them in their daily lives.

Unfortunately, we have had to make one difficult decision. So, starting this year, we will reduce the publication of the Marchwood Village News to three editions.

Reducing to three editions was difficult, but our recent distribution audit highlighted that a significant proportion of Marchwood had not received a copy for many years. Therefore, something had to be done to correct the situation, and reducing the number of editions was the most prudent outcome.

We would love to revert to quarterly publication, but we need to explore further opportunities to increase our income streams and continue to make operational savings before considering this.

It is challenging to balance the books and still deliver on our promise to make Marchwood a great place to live, work, raise a family and retire.

During the coming months, we intend to mark two key historic events.

Marchwood Parish Council will be laying a wreath to commemorate the end of World War II at the War Memorial at the Church of St John the Apostle at midday on Thursday, 8 May 2025, on behalf of our parishioners.

This hugely significant event remains a living memory for many of our parishioners. It is a timely reminder for all generations of the great sacrifice and perils that war presents, especially in these troubled times.

We are delighted to announce the 17th Maritime Regiment and pupils from Marchwood Junior School will also attend

Our new Parish Vicar, Reverend Lauren Cheshire, will officiate.

On 8 June, we will also gather at our Falklands Memorial to pay our respects to those killed on board the Sir Galahad and Sir Tristram, who were attacked by Argentine fighter jets on 8 June 1982.

As always, we were pleased that Captain Philip Roberts, the captain of Sir Galahad at the time, veterans and their families will be attending the commemoration.

Our honoured guests wanted me to thank our village and the Village's Landscape Team, who tirelessly maintain the memorial to their fallen comrades. I hope they enjoy our enhancements the next time they visit us.

In the autumn of 2023, with the assistance of local children, their parents and grandparents saw the planting of 4,000 crocus corms in aid of Hythe & Waterside Rotary's Purple4Polio campaign to end polio now and forever.

It was heartwarming to see that the crocus have survived and flourished, and we are in discussion to repeat the bulb planting this autumn.

We thank the community volunteers for the litter-picking events undertaken this year. The litter-pickers picked up a tremendous amount of litter and disposed of it, making our streets a cleaner, greener place to live and enjoy.

It often goes unsaid, but Marchwood prospers from the many unsung heroes and community champions who go under the radar, undertaking a range of community service in their own time.

They are modest folk who enjoy what they undertake without expectation of reward or recognition.

We must respect that, but it shouldn't stop us from showing gratitude. Therefore, it is appropriate to register our appreciation for what they do tonight and say, "Thank you".

The Parish Council would like to thank the Waterside Community Fund (formerly known as the Dibden Allotment Fund) for supporting individuals and organisations in the Parish.

Also, we wish to thank and congratulate the Handy Trust for the organisation's work and their staff's dedication to providing youth support throughout the year within the Parish.

The Planning Committee has and will continue to monitor any comments or concerns raised by our parishioners on planning applications within the Parish. We will listen to the concerns of parishioners so that we may be their voice within the District and County Councils.

Our Planning Committee Chairman, Councillor Mike Saxby, regularly reminds everyone if you see a green planning application pinned to a lamppost or telephone pole, don't just rely on the Council to make its feelings clear – your comments are equally relevant and welcomed by the planning authority.

Finally, I would like to thank all Parish Committee Chairs and fellow councillors for supporting me and helping make Marchwood a great place to live.

We are unpaid volunteers who have stood for public office, wanting to give back to the community where we have worked or lived for many years.

Being a Councillor is rewarding and fulfilling as it helps ensure our village issues are heard at the county and district level, especially as there will be many challenges ahead.

Having a full complement of councillors ensures the best representation of our collective concerns and issues and guarantees the viability of a sustainable and proactive council.

We encourage and welcome new volunteers to join us in our desire to continue to stand up and represent the Parish of Marchwood.

This is an opportunity for councillors to engage with our community, share what we have achieved, what we aim to achieve in the coming months, and update parishioners on matters of interest.

Later, there will be an opportunity for a Q&A to enable tonight's audience to ask questions that fall within the Parish Council's remit.

Firstly, welcome to our new meeting venue, The Hub, which we intend to make a greater focus of activity in the coming months.

Last year saw a significant investment in sustainable energy, which, in hindsight, seems a very prudent investment given the volatility in the world now.

We have installed a heat pump for central heating, solar panels, and battery storage to harness green energy, making The Hub more environmentally friendly and providing the parish with green energy that will not only reduce our energy bills but also charge our electric vehicles.

Later this year, we intend to switch to a different energy provider to benefit from electricity tariffs that will further reduce our energy bills.

Your council and officers are aware of the consequences of the now-familiar pattern of winter storms and the unfortunate flooding they leave behind, and we continue to work with other agencies to remind them that planning should be more acute to the dangers of climate change in their communities and ensure flood prevention is high on their agenda.

In recent years, we have been alerted to the term 'Riparian'. Riparian refers to the land immediately alongside a natural watercourse, such as a stream, brook, or, in our case, traditional ditches that take rainwater from the nearby fields and open spaces that run through Marchwood to the River Test and Southampton Water.

Riparian landowners typically own land up to the centre of a watercourse and are responsible for its maintenance, including preventing pollution and clearing blockages.

We take our responsibilities seriously, and I want to express our thanks to our team who have once again done a splendid job along Cork Lane. If your property has riparian areas, please ensure you undertake the appropriate maintenance.

Sadly, Marchwood has witnessed an increase in what is often termed 'anti-social behaviour', which manifests itself in many ways.

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Generally, anti-social behaviour refers to actions that cause or are likely to cause distress to others or create a nuisance/annoyance in communities.

One of the most common complaints we receive in the parish office is the encroachment of vegetation by properties adjacent to the public right-of-way, which endangers or obstructs users of the many footpaths in and around Marchwood.

Under Section 154 of the Highways Act 1980, it is the property owner's responsibility to ensure that any trees or hedges under their control do not encroach onto a public footpath. It is not socially acceptable for residents using mobility vehicles, pushchairs, or prams, or for pedestrians, to have to step onto the highway to travel through our village.

This is antisocial behaviour, and we can all do something about it.

Therefore, to avoid violating the Highway Act, please ensure this aspect of your garden spring clean is at the top of your Things to Do List.

Unfortunately, a minority of individuals have, in recent weeks, caused considerable anti-social behaviour in the Lloyds Recreation Ground. Much of this stems from wheel-spinning around the car park in the early hours. Or static vehicles blasting out loud music at all times of the day.

In addition, there appears to be a culture that this is somewhere to go and drink, even though there is a ban on alcohol in this area.

Once again, it is just a few individuals who are causing the issues. However, this shouldn't be an excuse for failing to take appropriate action.

The Council are aware of the anti-social behaviour and arranged a meeting with the local PCSOs to discuss the best way forward.

We had a very productive meeting and agreed to work with the police to identify cost-effective, proportionate ways to reduce the number of incidents.

Anti-social behaviour takes many forms, and parishioners are encouraged to inform the appropriate organisation of their concerns. Unfortunately, this unwelcome behaviour isn't restricted to the Lloyd Recreation Ground; I am aware of other areas around the village.

We are aware of the feelings of some parishioners about how effective our police are, but, like all public services, they are stretched, so they need all the information to appreciate what is happening fully and to justify the deployment of this finite resource.

Therefore, I urge you and your neighbours to keep reporting these matters to the police so they can build a picture of the problems we are facing. I'm afraid that if we do not, the senior officers who allocate resources will remain ignorant of our problems, and nothing will ever get done.

You can copy us in, so we are also aware of the number and types of incidents. When we have our regular meetings with appropriate officers and organisations, we have the evidence to hand and not hearsay.

Unfortunately, the parish council cannot solve all the problems alone; by working with our parishioners, statutory bodies, and elected officials, we will do our utmost to achieve the outcome we all want.

So, once again, I urge you and your neighbours to help us to help you.

We were very disappointed that our bid for funds to build a pump track at Cork Field was not successful, despite meeting the eligibility criteria and the support of our District Councillors.

However, this will not deter us from exploring how we can better use Cork Field for all our residents, particularly our young people and those who enjoy the open spaces for exercise and relaxation. We are fully committed to making Cork Field an inclusive, safe recreational area for everyone.

We were also disappointed that plans to refurbish the 3G Courts were rejected, but the project will proceed.

The 14-year delay for the pathway that follows the stream from Kingfisher Way, passing over Bilberry Drive, through The Rushes, and the Shorefield Development, to connect with Admiralty Way and the new Cork Farm development is beyond a joke.

Why has it taken so long, and why have there been so many false starts?

It is not for the want of trying on the part of your Parish Council and District Councillors.

After all, it is our money, which, sadly, has been eroded by ever-increasing costs and inflation.

One of our key priorities for the coming year is to improve our provision for our young people. The village has several playparks for the under-12s, but we are aware that we need to do more for our older young people, particularly facilitating activities during school holidays.

In recent days, we have begun a dialogue with an organisation with a proven track record of youth engagement, offering a wide range of options.

Once we have more details, the parish council will provide a further update, but we are very confident we have a summer programme in place for the long summer school holidays. But our plans will also include a programme for the autumn and winter, including weekends.

This is about bringing people together for a fun, relaxed day out – something for all ages, right here in Marchwood.

Everyone is welcome, so bring friends, family and neighbours along and help make it a great community day out.

However, we will maintain high standards, comply with our public safety licensing requirements, and ensure that avoiding public nuisance is the paramount concern.

Therefore, no glass bottles will be permitted on-site, and alcohol will be available only from our licensed bar. If you are lucky enough to look under 25, you will be asked to prove that you are aged 18 or over when you buy alcohol.

So, there is no time like the present to secure your tickets.

To stay ahead of events, we must make bold choices and aim for excellence. If we settle for just being good enough, we won't achieve excellence in all we aim to do.

Complacency and negativity are our biggest threats to achieving meaningful, long-term positive change in our village. We must be inclusive, understand, and engage with each other, both business and residents, if change is going to be positive.

We shouldn't be ashamed of pursuing dreams or challenging the status quo. Furthermore, we shouldn't be restricted by fear of potential obstacles.

We want real, tangible benefits for Marchwood, including improved road routes to alleviate heavy goods traffic and paths along our busy roads. The path from Cracknore Hard to Autumn Road has been a great addition, so can we dream of a decent path from Marchwood Industrial Park along Normandy Road up to Byams Lane?

The development of Solent Gateway 2 will remain one of our top priorities, and the parish council will continue to be involved in top-level discussions, as we have an excellent working relationship with ABP.

We see this as a significant opportunity for our village. We will only be successful if we continue to foster a healthy working relationship and promote honest, open communication networks, so we are informed throughout the planning and implementation process.

This approach also applies to the proposed development of the A326. The council has already been involved in the process, with Hampshire County Council briefing us and allowing us to comment on the many areas of concern, including the road junctions at Twiggs Lane and Staplewood Lane, the proposed Pilgrim Roundabout into Solent Gateway Two, and the flow of traffic through our village.

I am sure that when the outline plan is finally approved and serious planning is underway, further public consultation will be a regular occurrence.

I want to acknowledge the role that Southampton Football Club has played in our village life.

They kindly donated tickets for matches at St Mary's Stadium and have organised open days at Staplewood. We will continue to develop new opportunities, especially for our young people, during the coming months.

Hopefully, the kindness off the pitch will be rewarded on the field as they press for an early return to the Premier League.

Again, some of you may be aware of the review of the Hythe Ambulance Station. I am pleased to inform residents that I have been invited, along with others, to meet with the South-Central Ambulance Service to discuss the situation at Hythe Station. It will be interesting to hear about the proposed changes and how they will affect us.

Due to the local elections, the visit needed to be arranged after the election period, so I cannot provide further details at this time.

Unfortunately, partnership working was less evident when the local bus company changed its route without informing the community of its intentions, thereby preventing us from making a representation.

Similarly, our Good Neighbours policy was brushed aside, as we still await contact from the firm planning to build a tar distillery in the Industrial Park. Despite the lack of community engagement, we have submitted several concerns regarding the plan and await a response.

I don't know what this year will bring, but there are still many things to do and decide upon.

As a parish council, we should have high ambitions and not fear setting lofty, challenging goals.

Striving for excellence is a sign of strength and commitment to our community.

Being good enough, is simply, not good enough.

It has the main mown loop that is largely accessible for all, and the undulating thinner paths within the current BMX track. Suggestions to improve the path to make it 'all-weather' could be challenging due to the drainage of the site. The main problem with it as it stands is the standing water in Winter. To rectify this would involve building up a path significantly, which would be potentially costly. Personally, I think a dog agility area is unnecessary. The use of these areas is very 'niche' and wherever I've seen them elsewhere, they are largely unused. Further comment in the biodiversity section below.	This is the area that interests me the most based on the fact that I co-run the Marchwood Conservation Volunteers. The area adjacent to Normandy Way has been managed by the MCV for more than 30 years, in which time the number of flowering species has more than doubled thanks to careful management. My primary concern is for the protection of this area. Since mowing was stopped in the other areas of Cork Field, i.e. in the large central area and the current BMX track, nature has gradually begun to reclaim these areas also. The central area now has huge swathes of Cuckooflower in the Spring, and the BMX area is home to many wildflower species, including Pyramidal Orchids. These flowers support countless insect species, which in turn support the whole ecosystem including bats and birds. Despite concerns about developing the area, I appreciate the need for a balanced approach and the need for youth provision. If it were up to me, I would look to develop the central area (as the least biodiverse) for the Pump Track. I would leave the current managed area as it is, and would leave the current BMX track for nature,	In order for dog walkers and pump track users to utilise Cork Field in Harmony (and making the assumption that the pump track would be placed in the main central area of the field), I think it would be necessary to place a low fence around the pump track. If the ambition is for dogs to continue to be exercised off lead in the field, they will inevitably get on to the pump track, potentially fouling or causing a dangerous obstruction to the Pump Track users.
